



Brick Tear Out and Replacement

When a home owner, contractor, or architect contemplates the removal and replacement of brick, it is important to understand the consequences of such a decision. This is especially true if the main issue is brick color. There is a brick color correction application that is a proven, successful and widely accepted solution for brick color issues. This Brick color application should be considered before making a tear-down decision for brick color. One should also consider the following potential consequences of proceeding with a brick tear out and replacement:

Potential Collateral Damage

Tear out of existing brick work involves considerable force and typically involves the use of hammer drills and heavy equipment that can result in collateral damage.

- Damage to existing sheathing caused by removal of brick tie fasteners.
- Damage to existing siding and trim.
- Damage to existing windows.
- Damage to existing fixtures such as lighting.
- Damage to the weather resistant barrier.
- Damage to landscape features plants and shrubbery.

Potential color mismatch

Brick replacement can potentially lead to new color issues due to a mismatch of mortar color of change in brick color issues.

- Mortar color can vary for a variety of reason and including moisture content.
- Depending on the time lapse between replacement manufacturing changes or other factors may result in a change in the appearance of the brick units themselves.

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Potential for Consequential Effects

Brick tear out and replacement can be a complex undertaking and result in many consequential effects.

- Considerable delay of construction schedule and project closing.
 - Temporarily loss of occupancy of the building.
 - Disruption of the property and noise issues during the process.

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
